## IMPORT HEALTH REQUIREMENTS OF PAKISTAN FOR CATTLE EXPORTED FROM THE UNITED STATES

The animals must be accompanied by a U.S. Origin Health Certificate issue by a veterinarian authorized by the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) and endorsed by a Veterinary Services (VS) veterinarian. The certificate shall contain the name and address of the consignor and consignee, and a complete identification of the animals to be exported. Additional information shall include:

### CERTIFICATION STATEMENTS

1. The United States is free of foot-and-mouth disease, rinderpest, contagious bovine pleuropneumonia, East coast fever, heartwater, and Rift Valley fever.
2. The individual animals are free from clinical evidence of leukosis, leptospirosis, brucellosis, malignant catarrhal fever, paratuberculosis, rabies, bovine viral diarrhea, and infectious bovine rhinotracheitis.
3. The animals originate from premises where malignant catarrhal fever has not occurred for the last 2 years.
4. The animals were isolated under the supervision of an accredited veterinarian from the date the testing was initiated until shipment.

### TEST REQUIREMENTS

The animals were negative to the following tests conducted within 30 days of export:

1. Tuberculosis: Intradermal caudal fold test, using bovine PPD tuberculin.
2. Brucellosis: Standard tube test or standard plate test at 1:50 dilution and complement-fixation test at 1:10 dilution.
3. Paratuberculosis: Intradermal caudal fold test using avian tuberculin (not johnin) and complement-fixation test at 1:8 dilution.

### OTHER INFORMATION

All immunizations done previously must also be recorded on the health certificate.

### EMBARKATION CERTIFICATION

At the port of embarkation, a VS port veterinarian shall attach to the U.S. Origin Health Certificate, the Certificate of Inspection of Export Animals (VS Form 17-37) showing:

1. The name and address of the consignor.
2. The name and address of the consignee.
3. The number and species of animals to be shipped.
4. A statement that the animals have been given a careful veterinary inspection at the port of embarkation and found free from evidence of communicable disease and exposure thereto within 24 hours of exportation.
